Methods of Instruction

Methods of Instruction

Types	Examples of learning activities
Activity	Students interact with peers in directed activities focusing on language concepts they have studied. They are given speaking prompts and dialogues they practice together, and break into groups for more practice and opportunity to personalize language.
Discussion	Students discuss beginning topics with class and smaller groups, such as getting to know one another, likes and dislikes, hobbies and interests, families, etc.
Lecture	Instructor presents language excerpts and grammar concepts for students to model after. Instructor may include written and audio samples in the lecture.
